

It describes an action which takes part at the moment of speaking (now)

G2.2 Present Continuous and Present Simple

- We use the Present Continuous for things that:
 - a) are happening at the moment of speaking: I'm cooking dinner. That's exactly what I'm making!
 - b) are temporary and happening around now, but maybe not at this exact moment: I'm writing a book in my spare time. She's doing an evening course in traditional English cooking!
 - c) are changing over a period of time: The market is growing rapidly. They're becoming more common in Germany.

Present Simple describes a repeated or habitual action

Use of Present Simple

* To talk about permanent states/ facts/ general truths

e.g. I live in London

* To talk about habits

e.g. I play football every Tuesday.

For timetables (school, train, bus, planes etc.)

e.g. My flight leaves at 9 o'clock.

How do we form this tense?

S + Vinf

(subject + Verb infinitive)

If the subject is the third person singular (he, she, it), we add -s to the verb: S + V-s/-es

The boys play football every day.

Paul plays football every day.

Interrogative form

PUT DO AT THE BEGINNING OF THE POSITIVE SENTENCE:

DO + S + Vinf

They live in Spain.

Do they live in Spain?

Interrogative form

PUT DOES FOR THIRD PERSON AT THE BEGINNING OF THE POSITIVE SENTENCE:

DOES + S + Vinf

He lives in Spain.

Does he LIVES in Spain?

INTERROGATIVE FORM

SPECIAL ATTENTION: IN INTERROGATIVE FORM WE DO NOT USE S IN THIRD PERSON ONLY INFINITIVE! DOES SHE GOES TO SCHOOL?

Negative form

S + DO NOT (DON'T) + Vinf They live in London. They don't live in London.

Negative form

S + DOES NOT (DOESN'T) + Vinf

She lives in Lisbon.

She doesn't live in Lisbon.

ACTIVITY AND STATE VERBS

- Activity verbs talk about activities and actions. We can use activity verbs in the Present Simple and the Present Continuous (and other continuous verb forms): I watch TV every evening. I'm watching TV now. Typical activity verbs are: watch, talk, spend, eat, learn, buy, cook, take.
- State verbs talk about states, feelings and opinions. We don't usually use state verbs in the Present Continuous (or other continuous verb forms): I like broccoli. not I'm liking broccoli.






